

Request to Retest / Revise

Instructional Strategy – What is it?

Students can request to retake a test or revise work by completing a form. The form requires students to (1) reflect on their performance and learning strategies and (2) show evidence of relearning material. The goal is to encourage all students to master the content taught in your class and to help students discover better learning strategies.

Why does it work?

Providing students with the opportunity to learn from their mistakes and to develop better learning strategies can promote a growth mindset climate in your classroom. It also reinforces how continued effort and persistence can help students succeed.

How to do it?

1. *Create the form and plan your routine.* Create your form by determining what activities/study strategies you'd recommend to your students to demonstrate re-learning the material, how many activities/study strategies you will require students to show, and how long students will have to complete the form after a test or assignment. Consider how you will fit the additional grading into your workflow (e.g., do you have access to Teaching Assistants or graders who can help with grading?).
2. *Introduce the routine to students.* Around the time of the first major test or assignment, introduce the request forms to students. Explain the form to your students, particularly how it reinforces learning from mistakes and trying additional learning strategies.
3. *Coach students on the form.*
 - a. Students might need prompting to initiate this process. Consider having quick check-ins with students after the first test/assignment to encourage them to try the process.
 - b. Prepare specific suggestions of what students can work on to re-learn and improve, and offer specific feedback on whether students are getting the most out of the form
4. *Reflect on your own success using the form.* Track which students complete forms and how much their score improves on the redo in your gradebook. Also consider:
 - a. How many students are using the form?
 - b. Are all the students that *need* to retake using the form?
 - c. Are there better activities/learning strategies to add to the form? Are there activities/learning strategies that you should remove?
 - d. Are there common aspects about the form that are confusing students?
 - e. Are they improving their scores as much as you would like?
